
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Listen, Hippo! Gabriel Evans

PLOT SUMMARY

ABOUT THE AUTHOR



Gabriel Evans is a Western Australian children's book author and illustrator. Working primarily in watercolour and pencil, he creates books from a small studio on a big hill. Gabriel's books are

published internationally in more than twelve countries, have been reviewed in *The New York Times*, shortlisted in the CBCA Book of the Year Awards, translated into ten languages and read on ABC-TV's *Play School*.

Blue Flower by Sonya Hartnett, his first picture book with Penguin Random House, was shortlisted for the CBCA Picture Book of the Year in 2022. His second picture book with Penguin, *A Friend for George*, was published in 2023, followed by *Listen*, *Hippo!* released in 2024.

AUTHOR'S INSPIRATION

Gabriel says:

Listen, Hippo is a story about listening. There are times when we're sad and we want a friend to be there for us. Not to make us happy, to distract us or to share their opinions, but just to listen.


The sense of well-being when someone takes the time to listen can alleviate the sadness. Hippo learns to be that friend.

The illustrations were created using a mix of watercolour and pencil on paper.

Colour themes are used throughout relating to Billy and the Hippo's perspective.

THEMES

Feelings: Looking at the book's illustrations and text, identify how Billy is feeling. Using the illustrations in the book, children can identify parts of the story to link to their own experiences of expressing their feelings. They can talk about the use of different colours, techniques and other things of interest in the art and also talk about the artist and his techniques.

Friendship: Hippo is a special friend and does his best to cheer Billy up. What things do students do for their friends when their friends are feeling the way Billy does?

Listening: Using the illustrations in the book, children can identify parts of the story to link to their own experiences of listening and being listened to.

PRE-READING QUESTIONS

- Look at the front cover of the book. Read the title together. Can you see what the title is referring to? What do you think the story will be about?
- Open the book flat and explore the front and back cover as one large image. How does the choice of colours and the scene that is illustrated make you feel?
- Read the blurb at the back of the book. What do you feel about it? What kind of things are you now expecting to see inside the book? What questions do you have?
- Just inside the cover, before the title pages and the start of the story, are some illustrated pages. These are called 'endpapers'. What do the endpapers in the front of the book show you? What do they add to what you've already guessed about the story?
- Read the story aloud as a group, pausing to take in Gabriel Evans's artwork and observe all the detail and difference you can find on each page.

KEY STUDY TOPICS

Literacy, language and storytelling

Questions

 How many characters are in this story? Do you think creatures other than people can be characters in a story? Can you think of other stories that have non-human characters?

Activity

• <u>New Words</u>: Can you find three words in the book that are new to you? Try to work out what they mean from the context (the way they are used and what surrounds them).

Friendship, feelings and listening

Activity

- Write a story about your own experience of friendship. Include a time you listened to your friend and something you did to help them. Include a time you were feeling sad and happy.
- What do you think is the most important message in this book? What does it teach us about friendship and feelings?

Questions

- What do you notice about the very first page of the story? (Hint: what can you see?) What does it tell you about the characters in this book?
- What does it take to listen well?
- In what ways does Hippo listen to Billy?

Activities


 Write a sentence about a time someone listened to you on a piece of paper. Place all of the pieces of paper inside a box anonymously. Your teacher will share with the class the experiences that have been listed and ask the students to write a story about the importance of listening to our friends.

Visual literacy

Questions

- How much of the story is told through the text and how much through the illustrations?
- How do the illustrations help to establish the setting and mood of the story?
- Consider the amount of detail in every illustration. How does the detail help to add to the story?
- How does the illustrator manage to include emotion in his illustrations?
- Choose your favourite illustration and explain to the class what it is that you like about that page. How did you react to that page as a reader?

Why this story? A delightful picture book about a dog called Alfie who longs to be bold and brave like other dogs. Illustrated by the talented Simon Howe, who perfectly captures the emotional ups and downs of the adorable and expressive Alfie.


